

DEATH OF A POLICE MATRON.

Fall from a Step at the East Chicago Avenue Police Station Results Fatally for Mrs. Jennie Todd.

Mrs. Jennie Todd, lately matron at the East Chicago Avenue Police Station and who had been connected with the Police department for nine years, died yesterday at her house, 425 West Chicago avenue, as the result of injuries received on Tuesday by falling down the steps at the station where she was employed. The funeral is to be held tomorrow from St. Columbkil's Church. Interment will be at Calvary.

Mrs. Todd was appointed to the Police department under ex-Mayor De Witt C. Cregler and assigned to the West Chicago Avenue Station, where she served for three years. She was transferred to the Harrison Street Station during World's Fair year, and later went to Hyde Park. A year ago, at her own request, she went to the East Chicago Avenue Station. She was 52 years of age and was born in Louisville, Ky. Her husband, Robert Todd, an engineer on the Rock Island road, died five years ago. Her aged mother survives her.

Mrs. Todd received her injuries through a defective step. She was able to go home unassisted, and it was not believed that her injuries were of a serious nature. Later it developed that she had been injured internally.

George Steinert.

George Steinert, the oldest resident of the Town of Maine, died last evening in his home at Park Ridge, aged 98 years. He emigrated to this country over half a century ago and was an early settler in the neighborhood where he made his home during his declining years.
