## KipleY Removes Patrolmen Not Under Civil Service.

### TO MEET APPROPRIATION.

#### He Drops 168 and Retires 23 ; Others to Be Sworn in Again.

### MERIT LAW TO BE SUPREME.

#### President Winston Makes the List of Unfortunates.

#### NAMES OF THOSE AFFECTED.

All the patrolmen on the police force not now under the protection of the civil service law were discharged by a general order issued last night and which will go into effect at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning. At that time all but 101 of these discharged men will be certified to Superintendent KipleY by the Civil Service commission and put back on the force as regularly under the civil service law. The 101 will be dropped and in this manner the force will be brought inside the appropriation and under the control of the commission at the same time.

Superintendent KipleY's order reads as follows:

Chicago, March 12.—General Order No. 8.—All patrolmen at headquarters, in the Detective bureau, the First Precinct, and the Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, and Eighth Precincts of the First Division not certified for appointment by the Civil Service commission, are hereby discharged from the force, to take effect Monday, March 14, at 9 a. m.

All patrolmen affected by the above order will report at the office of the Civil Service commission for certification in the following order:

- Headquarters and Detective bureau at 9 a. m.
- First Precinct at 9:30 a. m.
- Second Precinct at 11 a. m.
- Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, and Eighth Precincts at 2 p. m.

#### Still Sixty Men Over.

With these 161 men off the force it will still be sixty men more than the appropriation bill will provide for. Superintendent KipleY said last night, however, he thought there would be enough cases of men losing pay during the year from some cause to take care of these extra men.

The list of dropped men given above was made up by Commissioner Winston, who asserts that nothing but the records of the men was taken into consideration in preparing it. He practically had it ready before the recent trial came on, and then all the business of the commission was suspended till it was over. Mr. Winston said the reason he got it together then was to have it out of the way before next Tuesday's primaries. Mayor Harrison, however, was anxious to have the matter of what policemen were to go and what to stay settled before Monday night, as he feared an assault on the appropriation bill in the interest of providing money enough to keep them all on the force.

From 9 o'clock tomorrow morning until some time in the afternoon, when the patrolmen of the First Precinct are sworn in, the South Side will be practically without police protection. The men will be sworn in by the Civil Service board in squads of 200 at a time.

During the afternoon Chief KipleY and President Winston submitted the list to the Mayor and it was approved. An effort was made to keep the names of the discharged men secret, and for three hours both Chief KipleY and President Winston refused to give it out. It was said they were acting under instructions from the Mayor.

Stories were afloat that the scheme was devised to use the Police department at the Democratic primaries on Tuesday, the idea being to let it be known that 200 men were to be dropped and that the patrolmen who failed to do their duty at the polls in the interest of the administration's candidates would be on the list.
