

OPEN NEW STATION WEDNESDAY

Modern Police Quarters at Grace and Robey Streets Soon Ready for Occupancy.

It is expected that the new police station at Grace and Robey streets will be ready for occupancy on Wednesday. An order placing a lieutenant in charge may be made today.

The new precinct will be known as "forty-three." It will have for its territory the west half of precinct forty-two, or that district bounded by Ashland avenue on the east, Lawrence avenue on the north, the river on the west, and Belmont avenue on the south.

The new station will cost nearly \$40,000 and will be the first modern station to be completed. The new one at Halsted and Addison streets, that will replace the old Town Hall station, will be ready for occupancy in another week.

Other stations that will be completed before next winter are those at:

- California and Shakespeare avenues.
- Forty-ninth and State streets.
- Near Seventy-fifth street and Dobson avenue.
- Fortieth avenue and Fillmore street.
- Hamilton avenue, between Twenty-second street and Ogden avenue.

The station at California and Shakespeare avenues will cost \$115,000 and will be the largest in Chicago. It will have among other features a library for the policemen. This will largely be of a statistical and municipal nature—fiction being barred.

Friends of Capt. William P.
