

FINE NEW POLICE STATION INSPECTED BY FIVE THOUSAND

**Mayor Busse and Chief Shippy Deliver
Addresses at Housewarming in the
Thirty-fifth Precinct.**

The new Thirty-fifth precinct police station at California avenue and Shakspeare street--sans beer, sans boxing gloves--was thrown open to the public last evening and between 7 and 11 p. m. over 5,000 people inspected the building. It is a three story and basement pressed brick structure, with fifty feet frontage and 150 feet depth and, including the lot, cost \$200,000.

Each feminine visitor was given an American beauty rose and the men were supplied with cigars. There were no liquors inside the building. Capt. Patrick J. Harding, Lieuts. Joseph Paleczynski, Charles Larkin, and Thomas Maher and Sergeants Peter Lynch, John McNally, John Henning, and W. H. Brundage acted as a reception committee, assisted by a number of patrolmen.

The first prisoner was brought in at 8 o'clock by Sergeant John McNally, who found him wandering about the street. Half an hour later a woman entered the station and claimed the prisoner. She said she was his mother and that his name was Alfred Gros-guth, aged 2 years, and he lived at 908 Wash-tenaw avenue.

The top floor is occupied by the gymnasium, dormitories, and handball court. The second floor by the courtroom, judges' chambers, billiard room, library, and private bedrooms of captains and lieutenants. The ground floor is used for general offices, squadroom, cell-room, and stables. The basement will contain the engine room and pistol range.

Mayor Busse and Chief Shippy delivered speeches in the new station.
