

WILSON PLACES 4 CAPTAINS IN EACH DISTRICT

Transfers 10, Assigns 31 New Commanders

Police Supt. O. W. Wilson completed his plan to place four captains in each district with assignments yesterday of 31 newly promoted captains and transfers of 10 others.

Wilson had listed in his police reorganization plans a proposal to assign three watch captains to each of 21 districts. The plan was in effect in several districts before yesterday's order. The plan releases district commanders of extra duties as watch commanders during their on-duty hours.

Three to Chicago Lawn

The new assignments, effective Jan. 1, were announced by James B. Conlisk, deputy superintendent of police. The assignments disclosed that three new captains were being sent to the Chicago Lawn and to the Chicago avenue stations as watch commanders.

Eight of the captains will remain in the posts they served as lieutenants. They are Thomas Marriner, labor relations; Thomas J. Lyons, training division; Thomas Hoban, Chicago Lawn district commander; Walter Gehr, crime laboratory; Edward Egan, Kensington district commander; Mark Thanasouras, training division; Edward Barry, state's attorney's office; and William Miller, records and communications.

New watch commanders at the following stations are:

Central, John Jemito and John Coffey; Wabash, Edward Sheehy; Hyde Park, Ronald Nash; Grand Crossing, Harold Miles; South Chicago, Thomas Reppetto and William Gastel; Gresham, Harry Sheahan; Englewood, John Sheehy; Chicago Lawn, Anthony Brankin, Francis Bailey, and Frank Fallis; New City, George Green and Vincent Nolan; Marquette, Francis Cogherty and James Stokes; Monroe street, Francis Lynch; Albany Park, Richard McGuinness; Chicago avenue, Raymond Clark, Bartley Hines, and William Payne; Town Hall, William Mazurek; and traffic area two, Joseph Drennon.

Tell New Promotions

Barry and Bailey were late additions to the list of promotions. Bailey will fill the vacancy of Lt. Harry J. Metz, 52, who died Thursday on the eve of his promotion to captain. Wilson said it was necessary to promote two men because Barry, who ranked at the top of the promotion list, is on detached duty in the state's attorney's office and is not available for regular duty.

Jerome McCarthy, from Gresham to Kensington; John Kistner, from Chicago Lawn to Gresham; Brendan Hartford, Central to New City; John Northen, from Chicago Lawn to Monroe street; Patrick Deely, from Marquette to Wood street; Phillip Moss from Central to Shakespeare; Phillips Iden, from Chicago avenue to Austin; Henry Hartman, from Chicago avenue to Jefferson Park; John Moss, from New City to Albany Park; Patrick Needham, from Jefferson Park to Summerdale.
