

21 NEW POLICE CAPTAINS TO BE NAMED IN '63

Police Supt. Orlando W. Wilson announced yesterday that he intends to name 21 new police captains early next year.

They will be picked from the civil service captain's list. Wilson said he also will name 21 new lieutenants to take the places of those who become captains.

The move will be made, Wilson said, to make it possible to have captains on duty around the clock as watch commanders in place of lieutenants who hold that position in many stations.

Head Captain's List

The promotion of the 21 still will leave a few police watches commanded by lieutenants, he said.

Selection will be made, Wilson said, from the 25 top men on the captain's list. They are:

Lyons Is Youngest

Marriner is presently in charge of the police labor detail. Thomas Lyons, 28, is the youngest lieutenant on the force, and if promoted would be the youngest captain. Maurovich is director of the police internal investigation division and is a former assistant state's attorney. William L. Miller is in charge of the police communication center.

In addition to Egan, four other district commanders are not captains. They are Joseph Hurley, Robert Lynskey, Thomas Hoban, and Thomas Ryan.

The police information department said that 30 captains will have been added to the force since Supt. Wilson took charge in March, 1960, when the 21 new men are sworn in. The department released the following statistics comparing Wilson's current operation with that of his predecessor, Police Commissioner Timothy J. O'Connor:

There were 38 police districts before Wilson took command and these were consolidated into 21.
